



Structured debate

is an organised and moderated (directed) discussion of a group of people who exchange arguments on a selected topic. It can follow a specific scenario.



The subject of a structured debate is **predetermined**. It should be formulated in such a way as to **engage the participants in the discussion**.

At the same time, the **topic cannot be easily or quickly resolved**, because the debate will not bring the expected result.

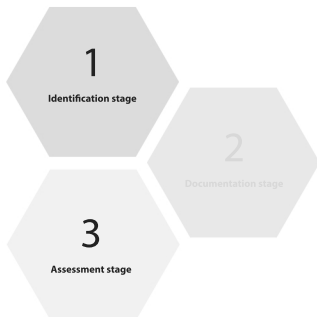
The task of the debate participants may be, for example, to actively participate to solve problems and answer problem questions on the basis of joint investigations, considerations and conclusions.

The structured debate participant should demonstrate, among others: in-depth knowledge on a given subject, the ability to present their own position, and the ability to assess the positions of other people.


The assessor listens to the debate and assesses individual candidates. His/her competences in interpreting participants' behaviours during discussions as well as the ability to use tools to assess the debate are important.

The results obtained using this method are usually repeatable regardless of the place and time of the validation.

The validation stages in which the use of the method is recommended





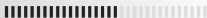

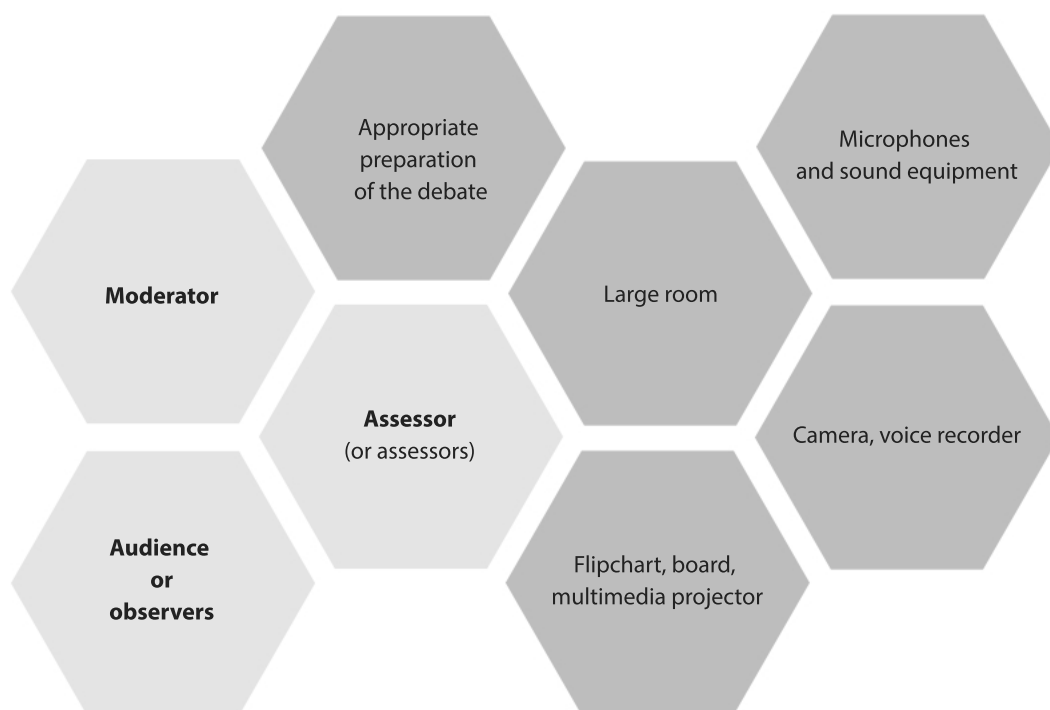
